# **BAKED ZUCCHINI CHIPS WITH CREAMY ITALIAN DIP**



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A nutritional alternative to fries, these zucchini chips can be used as an appetizer, snack, or side to an entrée.

To make it a real crowd pleaser, be sure to make the accompanying dip. Recipe yields: approximately 16 chips.

## **Chip Ingredients**

- 2 fresh zucchinis. Remove ends and cut into <sup>1</sup>/<sub>8</sub> -inch slices. Dry with paper towel
- 2 egg whites, beaten
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup low-fat, lactose-free buttermilk
- 1/2 cup panko breadcrumbs
- 1/2 cup cornmeal
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon dry Italian seasoning

## Steps

- 1. In a small bowl, mix yogurt, mayonnaise, herbs, lemon juice, and lemon rind. Refrigerate to chill dipping sauce
- 2. Preheat the oven to 475 degrees
- 3. In one small bowl, stir together breadcrumbs and the dry seasonings
- 4. Mix the beaten egg whites and buttermilk in a separate bowl
- 5. Dip zucchini slices into the egg-white wash, then coat the slices in breadcrumb mixture
- 6. Place each slice on a baking sheet with a rack or parchment paper
- Bake for 5 minutes, turn over, and bake for another 5 to 10 minutes, or until browned and crispy
- 8. Serve zucchini chips with chilled dip

- 6 ounces nonfat, lactose-free Greek yogurt
- 1 tablespoon olive oil mayonnaise
- 1 tablespoon fresh, finely chopped basil or 2 teaspoons dry basil
- 1 teaspoon fresh, finely chopped thyme or 1/4 teaspoon dry thyme
- 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 1 tablespoon of lemon juice

#### INDICATIONS AND USAGE

Sandostatin<sup>®</sup> LAR Depot (octreotide acetate) for injectable suspension is indicated for patients in whom initial treatment with immediate-release Sandostatin<sup>®</sup> (octreotide acetate) Injection has been shown to be effective and tolerated for

- Long-term treatment of the severe diarrhea and flushing episodes associated with metastatic carcinoid tumors
- Long-term treatment of the profuse watery diarrhea associated with VIP-secreting tumors

In patients with carcinoid syndrome and VIPomas, the effect of Sandostatin Injection and Sandostatin LAR Depot on tumor size, rate of growth, and development of metastases has not been determined.

## IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

**Warnings and Precautions:** Treatment with Sandostatin LAR Depot may affect gallbladder function, with postmarketing reports of gallstones resulting in complications (inflammation of the gallbladder, bile duct, and pancreas, and requiring surgical removal of the gallbladder); sugar metabolism; thyroid and heart function; and nutritional absorption, which may require monitoring by your doctor. Call your doctor if you experience signs or symptoms of gallstones or any of their complications.

**Before Taking Sandostatin LAR Depot:** Tell your doctor if you have a history of heart disease or are taking other medications, including cyclosporine, insulin, oral hypoglycemic agents, beta-blockers, and bromocriptine.
